Visit a Museum: "Science museums are fun because they typically provide so many handson exhibits for kids, which will really get your kiddos thinking and asking questions. Natural history museums, art museums, and historical museums [are] all over the place. Our local children's museum has a reciprocal agreement with other children's museums, so we can get free admission other places with our annual pass to our own museum."

Additionally, check into military bases. They generally have museums that offer free admission—no matter how small the museum! Simply googling museums in a particular area can lead to discovering tons of small, affordable mom-and-pop style places full of unique, local history.

**Getting involved in sports:** "If your local schools

don't allow homeschoolers to participate in sports or extracurricular activities, see if there is a local co-op that allows homeschoolers to participate in sports; basketball, baseball, soccer, softball, volleyball, track, cross-country, swimming, weight-lifting, etc...Contact your local gym or fitness place to see if they offer classes for homeschoolers. Many children participate in these extracurricular activities after school hours, so it should be easy to find a place."
